



Fledgling track team claims victory at first meet

Running, jumping, and throwing. Most people know that the sport of track and field encompasses all these activities within a variety of individual sports. What many people do not know is that Schweinfurt now has its first Child, Youth and School Services track and field team.

Since mid-April, more than 30 Schweinfurt youth between the ages of 6 and 17 years old gather for practice three times a week to condition and train. Practices take place rain or shine and their coach, Darryl Jones, keeps them moving at a fast pace.

"I like how we train hard. It makes me faster. I can feel it in my legs, and my lungs are better," said Tymon Blow, 12 years old.

"Since this is our first year, this is all developmental track and field—teaching the kids the technique of running and what track and field is all about," said Darryl. Within the first week of practice, he said, the team went from five kids to nearly 30 participating.

The first track meet took place at the end of May in Vicenza, Italy, against youth from Hohenfels, Heidelberg, and Vicenza. The Schweinfurt athletes took away a total of 40 ribbons: 16 first place, 12 second place, and 12 third place. In addition to the multitude of individual wins, the fledgling Schweinfurt team racked up the most points for the overall win, taking victory over the three other communities.

"The emotions were overwhelming because I had no idea that our athletes would perform to that level," said Darryl. His main goal was to show up at the track meet and make it known that Schweinfurt had formed a team.

"But it seems like our kids want more than that. They wanted to let (competitors) know that we have some athletes, too," he said.

"For some, it was their very first track meet. They were very enthused and I was happy to see that," said Lynette Jones, assistant coach and wife of Darryl.

Now, preparing for the next meet Saturday in Wiesbaden, the

youth are training hard at the DJK sports complex facilities. Help from parents is essential for the kids to get individual training on their events, Darryl said.

"I have a core of parents that are standing at the ready to help me whatever it is that I need ... and another good thing is that the parents even come to practice to work out with the children," he said.

Expectations are now a little higher than before for all involved. Darryl has matched the training regiment to the newly raised expectations.

"I'm excited for the kids, and I'm excited for Schweinfurt," said Darryl, anticipating the remaining three track meets with the final held in Grafenwoehr July 11.

Wearing a helmet can prevent serious injury

Bikes or rollerblades prove to be a preferred means of transportation for some people. However, when climbing on a bike or strapping on the skates, one essential piece of equipment cannot be forgotten: a helmet.

“It’s important that everybody who rides a bike—children, youth, and adults— wear a bike helmet,” said Eduard Sauer, USAG Schweinfurt safety officer.

Bike riders often undervalue the importance of wearing a helmet, Sauer explained, adding that they also may not know how a helmet should fit.

“It’s important you buy a helmet that really fits on your head. It needs to stay. If it doesn’t shake, there’s no pressure, and you can’t feel it, then it’s fit to your head,” he said.

Community members on bikes or rollerblades who come on post without a helmet will be asked to get off their equipment and walk. It’s a Department of Defense rule, Sauer said.

According to the consumer product safety commission Web site, a very high percentage of head injuries can be prevented by a helmet, estimated at anywhere from 50 to 88 percent.

“If you fall, helmets prevent concussions, cracked skulls and other serious injuries,” Sauer said.

Biking and rollerblading can be a lot of fun, but don’t let accidents happen. Follow the safety standards.

Schweinfurt urged to join in Army 10-Miler

HEIDELBERG, Germany – A reminder for those aiming to compete in this year’s U.S. Army Europe 10-Miler team: the top finishers from the 2008 qualifying race are still in theater and are training for the 2009 run that will be held June 27 in Grafenwoehr.

Joel Steward, who took first place last year in the men’s division with a course record of 56.25 minutes, said: “I do hope to compete ... I hope to be in good enough shape to finish strong.”

The top 12 active-duty Soldiers (six each in the men and women’s divisions) will be nominated to represent U.S. Army Europe during the Oct. 4 Army 10-Miler in Washington, D.C. To be considered, male competitors must finish under 68 minutes, while female runners must finish at 86 minutes or better.

Additionally, they will need commander’s approval to be placed on orders, said Jim Mattingly, Installation Management Command-Europe sports and fitness director.

The men’s team that represented Europe last year placed third, with the women’s

squad placing ninth in their division.

While only Soldiers can compete for the U.S. Army Europe team, everyone holding a U.S. Department of Defense identification card, and who are at least 18, may participate in the June 27 race. Last year’s Europe 10-Miler attracted 117 participants.

“The hub of activities will be the new fitness center at U.S. Army Garrison Grafenwoehr,” said Mattingly. “The final stretch will be a one-mile lap near the fitness center, where spectators and fans will be able to cheer the runners on to the finish line.”

Tourist passports necessary for leisure travel

Taking vacation into other countries with a no-fee passport may cause trouble at the borders. Some of this trouble is due to the fact that many people aren’t aware of the differences between a no-fee passport and a tourist passport.

Soldiers and their families stationed overseas are under what’s referred to as a status of forces agreement (SOFA) with their host country, which defines the legal status of those members in the territory of another nation. To comply with SOFA, a no-fee passport is issued to service members and their families who are serving overseas, said Dennis Randall, human resources specialist for the military personnel division (MPD).

Randall explained that people are not to use these no-fee passports for leisure travel throughout Europe, but to use a tourist, or regular-fee passport

instead.

“With tourist passports, you can travel anywhere in Europe while a no-fee passport is issued by the government for you to be on official business outside the United States while your (Soldier) is stationed overseas,” he said.

Recent confusion on which passport is used for what type of travel has caused problems for some Schweinfurt residents.

“We had a family get stuck in Austria with their no-fee passports and they had to pay a visa fine right there,” said Nacommas Jones, MPD customer service supervisor.

To avoid the stress of random border checks when traveling, be sure that each individual traveling is in possession of a tourist passport. Randall and Jones further suggest travelers bring both passports, just to be on the safe side.

“If you’re outside of Germany with only a no-fee passport, with no tourist passport, and they just happen to have a border check, they’re going to ask you what official business you are doing in that country,” Randall said, adding that each country will respond to the situation based on their own national policy.

To obtain a passport, whether it is a no-fee or tourist, visit the MPD in building 40 on Conn Barracks. Appointments and walk-ins welcome. For more information, call 09721-96-8829.





Tribute paid to victims of D-Day atrocity

HEMEVEZ, France -- Servicemembers from the United States, alongside French and German Soldiers and residents of this small village in Normandy gathered in a local churchyard June 5 to pay their respects to seven Soldiers executed by German troops during on D-Day.

The Soldiers knew they could die. They were members of the 1st Battalion, 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment -- paratroopers jumping behind enemy lines. But they were not supposed to die the way they did.

On June 6, 1944, hours before the invasion of Normandy, they jumped into the fields surrounding the town. What actually happened there would remain a mystery

for decades.

“Seven parachutes landed near the chateau, which was being used as German headquarters,” said Ernest Moucel, who was 18 years old at the time.

In an ensuing firefight eight paratroopers were taken captive by German Soldiers. One of those paratroopers, Pvt. Ashton Landry,

was able to escape.

“A gentleman named Pierre Renaut saw them (the remaining seven Soldiers) cross the field before they were killed,” said Moucel.

It was in that field that the paratroopers were executed, each with a single shot to the back of the head. Because Renaut did not witness the execution, their bodies were discovered by a French farmer who was a World War I veteran.

He recognized that the Soldiers were not normal casualties of war, but victims of a war crime.

Moucel was one of four men who took the bodies of the Soldiers and gave them a proper burial in the cemetery of the town’s church.

“We wanted to make sure that they were buried the same day,” he said.

Twenty days later, the bodies were exhumed and reburied at the American cemetery in Colleville-sur-Mer, where today’s American Cemetery and Memorial is located.

The exhumation was filmed for documentation. A historian doing research on the 507th found a copy of the film in military archives in Washington D.C., and was able to piece together the story of what happened in the field. A memorial was erected to the seven Soldiers in 2004.

Soldiers who attended the ceremony here this week said it was a moving experience.

“I’m glad that I was given the opportunity to be here and partake in the ceremony and I’m grateful for them -- that they gave their lives for freedom,” said Sgt. 1st Class Dialetta Taylor, a chaplain’s assistant with Special Troops Battalion, 21st Theater Sustainment Command.
