



Haager relinquishes command to Spain

In a ceremony on Conn Barracks Tuesday, Lt. Col. Everett Spain assumed command of the U.S. Army Garrison Schweinfurt, succeeding Lt. Col. Anthony Haager, who commanded the garrison since July 2006.

Calling it a “historic moment for the Schweinfurt community,” Diane Devens, director, Installation Management Command – Europe Region, noted the significance in the timing of the ceremony.

“The passing of these flags might seem insignificant to the casual eye, but in fact, this move signifies achieving a milestone on the path to the global defense posture realignment, which called for a significantly transformed Army worldwide,” she said, referring to the impending command-and-control shift of the USAG Schweinfurt to an indirect-report garrison under the USAG Ansbach.

“It’s very symbolic, this change of command ceremony, in terms of the Army’s transformation here in Europe,” she said.

Col. Christopher Hickey, USAG Ansbach commander, also delivered remarks and praised Spain’s service.

“A quick read of his biography will reveal that this officer is not only a superb leader but a scholar and an athlete,” Hickey said.

“I look forward to working with you as we implement this new streamlined command structure to provide best possible service to our mission units, Soldiers and their families,” Hickey said, addressing Spain.

Spain, who was stationed in Germany earlier in his career, comes to Schweinfurt with his wife and four children from his

Some fall plants, berries can be fatally toxic

Autumn brings with it brilliantly colored leaves, bushes, and berries. Edible fruits like apples and plums are abundant this time of year, but also prolific are poisonous berries and other plants that may take on an appetizing appearance to the untrained eye.

“This time of year there is so much,” said USAG Schweinfurt safety manager Eddi Sauer. “A great variety of plants are toxic, but most you won’t die from immediately.”

Most importantly, he said, is to teach young children not to touch or eat anything without permission.

“Teach them they are nice to look at,” he said but not to touch or eat. The younger a child is, the more a plant’s toxicity can affect them, Sauer said.

Many native and exotic plants are poisonous to humans when eaten or even if there is only skin contact with plant chemicals, said the Web site for Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

“If you do not know what you are eating, don’t pick it,” Sauer said.

Some berries, which are harmless to animals, can be extremely hazardous to humans, causing illness, injury or even death.

“In the child care facilities, we have removed all this,” Sauer said, explaining how highly toxic plants and berries are no longer near where children play.

But, if a child or adult consumes any type of unknown plant or berry, there are important steps to take. Sauer strongly recommends calling a doctor immediately, even if side effects have not appeared, because one never knows how toxic a plant may be. Once symptoms begin, precious time has already been lost for treatment.

The American Association of Poison Control Centers Web site restates the importance of calling a health care professional. Many times the problem can be taken care of over the phone, but in some cases, people must be rushed to the hospital.

In addition, Sauer recommends bringing a sample of the plant consumed when seeking medical care for possible poisoning, to help better identify the course of treatment needed.

After three intense weeks at the Joint Multinational Readiness Center training for their fourth deployment in six years, Soldiers from the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team and their families spent Sept. 13 celebrating Sky Soldier Banner Day at U.S. Army Garrison Hohenfels.

Split between three locations—Bamberg and Schweinfurt, Germany and Vicenza, Italy—the brigade rarely finds themselves together in the same location, making the day after the conclusion of their training the perfect opportunity to engage in a day of games, sports and team building.

“Banner Day presents a unique opportunity for Sky Soldiers and Family members from our three home stations to assemble in one location. The goal of this rare occasion is for members of our team to relax after a challenging exercise and bond through athletic competition and events,” said Col. James Johnson, brigade commander.

Soldiers kicked the day off early with a 6:30 a.m. start for the first ever brigade run in a formation that spread almost the entire length of Hohenfels’ main post road.

“It is good to get the whole brigade together. We all have buddies in other units and competition between units strengthens esprit de corps,” said Shuba.

“When we’ve been away for a long time and will be deploying, it’s important to have a huge family event like this. It’s important to involve them in our mission—what we do and what we stand for,” said Capt. Jonathan Mecham, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, whose wife made the trip from Vicenza to participate in the event.

Those memories for families and Soldiers alike are why the staff from USAG Hohenfels Family, Morale, Welfare and Recreation put all their effort into coordinating an exceptional event, said Stacey Downing, FMWR director.

“We felt honored and privileged that they were giving us the opportunity to support such a huge initiative,” said Downing. “Every single person is really committed to taking care of Soldiers and families; it doesn’t matter where they’re stationed.”

At the end of the day, Johnson thanked USAG Hohenfels and the FMWR staff for their hard work and spoke to Sky Soldiers about what Banner Day means for the brigade.

the deployment,” said Capt. Christopher Shepherd, rear detachment commander.

Sept. 24 will mark the next session available to spouses and will especially highlight important information concerning casualty notifications and support. It will be held at the Conn Chapel, beginning at 1 p.m.

“It’s a tough topic, but we really want to make sure the spouses know how our procedures are going to work and how they can be prepared. The casualty assistance center on post is going to talk to the spouses about basic casualty procedures and our

chaplain is going to discuss our care team. Furthermore, we’ll explain our squadron casualty notification procedures, so they know how we are going to handle and support the families if something happens,” Shepherd said.

Later in October, a family deployment brief will further prepare those facing a deployment as families are equipped with a checklist and have the opportunity to speak with different agencies within the Schweinfurt community.

“One of our primary focuses is supporting the family members so that

the troops downrange can focus on their mission and not worry about the concerns back at home stations. ... The best way we can start doing that is by providing as much information as possible to the families,” Shepherd said.

“We want to increase self-sufficiency of every spouse who will have a trooper deployed and thereby reduce the anxiety of the unknown,” Fellingner added.

Deputy Secretary of Defense visits FOB Kalsu

FORWARD OPERATING BASE KALSU, Iraq – Soldiers of the 172nd Infantry Brigade had the opportunity to meet the Deputy Secretary of Defense and demonstrate the different duties and jobs that make the base functional Sept. 11.

The Honorable William J. Lynn III visited with Soldiers of 504th Military Intelligence Company, 9th Engineer Battalion and 172nd Support Battalion.

Starting at the unmanned aerial vehicle launch site, Soldiers of 504th Military Intelligence Company demonstrated and explained the importance of the UAV.

“I think it went really well and it shows how people take the time to come out here and let us tell them about what we do out here,” said Spc. Matthew D. Palmer, UAV operator, 504th Military Intelligence Company and native of Troy, Mo.

Following the UAV demonstration, 9th EN Bn Soldiers showed Lynn the different vehicles used for route clearance missions. Lynn toured through the Mine Resistant Ambush-Protected vehicle, which is the primary medical evacuation vehicle for route clearance missions.

Lynn learned how to inspect a rock from within the Buffalo, a heavily armored

counter improvised explosive device vehicle. Using a mechanical arm with a small camera attached, Lynn moved the rock around in search of a possible IED. The engineers use this vehicle to probe for potential IEDs out in sector.

After looking at each of the vehicles, Soldiers of 172nd Spt Bn, showed Lynn different maintenance capabilities.

Lynn met and shook hands while

recognizing the Soldiers from the different battalions by presenting them with his personalized coin before leaving Kalsu.

“I’m happy that he came out here so the Soldiers could show him how hard we work,” said Staff Sgt. Jason Kudla of the 504th Military Intelligence Company. “Visits like these show that leaders do care, even if it is only to let the Soldiers talk and shake hands.”
