



## VA briefing educates, eases transition

The Department of Veteran Affairs plays an active role in supporting those service members and their families separating from the military. To ensure military members everywhere understand the existing benefits, VA representatives make their rounds to garrisons worldwide to conduct briefings at designated

transition sites.

"The goal with this whole thing is to make certain (they) have an easy transition," said Bill Treadwell, a retiree and VA rep from Camp Lejeune, N.C. who came to Schweinfurt to brief the community.

The Schweinfurt briefings, one most recently occurring Monday with 170 participants, provide information on full-range VA benefits including education, compensation, health care, insurance, disabled benefits, and pension, to name a few.

"It's important to know that these briefings are open to everyone; it's open to the community," said Shannon Gray, Army Career and Alumni Program (ACAP) manager.

The briefings, according to Gray, are especially beneficial because numerous Soldiers and their family members are unaware of what is available to them through VA.

"VA ties into their future jobs, it ties into their education, their compensation; it ties into so many aspects of their life, so they need to understand," she said.

Although not required, everyone, especially those separating from the military, is encouraged to attend to the briefing. Information provided from the meeting can jumpstart their retirement or separation and ensure timely receipt of earned benefits.

"I urge you; get started now on your application. You don't

## Assistant inspector general advocates for Soldiers, commands

Sgt. 1<sup>st</sup> Class Adam Harrer, a Bamberg-based assistant Inspector General (IG), U.S. Army Europe, calls himself and his colleagues the "eyes, ears and conscience of the commanding general."

"We're independent fact-finders," Harrer said of IG staffs.

Sgt. 1<sup>st</sup> Class A.J. LeBlanc, the new assistant IG for the Schweinfurt community, brings his background as a military policeman to the position from Fort Carson, Colo.

"I really just look forward to being that person who can just help USAREUR and the Schweinfurt community focus in on what General Ham's and of course the USAREUR IG, their vision of the way operations should run," LeBlanc said.

Part of the job of an IG is not only to solve existing problems but to prevent potential trouble spots from escalating, said LeBlanc, noting observations from his first few weeks on the job.

"One thing that I've seen is that every single commander simply wants to know about the problem and what they have to do to fix the problem," he said. "So there is a genuine concern...they legitimately, honestly care about their Soldiers and want to fix a problem or prevent a problem from happening."

Harrer and LeBlanc, in Bamberg and Schweinfurt, respectively, are among the first four Soldiers assigned to USAREUR Mission Support Elements (MSEs), also currently

located in Baumholder and Ansbach.

"A Soldier here in Schweinfurt doesn't have to call Heidelberg and we become just a voice on the phone or an email. There's a face to it," Harrer said of the benefits to having IG representation at each community.

The assistant IGs offer their services to any Soldier or civilian, according to Harrer, but they ask Soldiers to do a bit of legwork on their own behalf before coming to the IG.

"One of the first questions we ask Soldiers is, 'Have you engaged your chain of command?'" Harrer said. "If the command doesn't know there's an issue, they can't fix it."

# Resourcing the Army home

## Installation funding levels on the decline

*A message from Lt. Gen. Rick Lynch*

WASHINGTON, D.C. - In recent years, the Army and its Installations have enjoyed unprecedented levels of funding. In fiscal year 2008, the Army hit a high water mark in its fiscal history with a total annual budget exceeding \$250 billion - three times more than FY 2001 funding level.

Much of this growth is attributed to funding the war, rebalancing our Army through investments in Army's force structure, equipment, infrastructure, and key Soldier and Family programs.

Funding levels of this magnitude are unsustainable year after the year and as the country faces some stiff economic challenges, we are forced to reduce funding and exact a greater level of stewardship over our resources.

The Installation Management Command - like other commands throughout our Army - will operate at reduced funding levels. This means that starting in 2010, performance levels for some installation services will be notably less than what we have had in recent years and will remain at that level for the foreseeable future.

Our challenge is to ensure those key, higher-priority programs across our installations do not suffer. We will maintain our full support to Life, Health and Safety programs, the Army Family Covenant and those services that prepare our Soldier and their Families for deployment in support of the Army's Force Generation model.

These are non-negotiables that will remain fully funded. This is our commitment; we will not depart from it. However, there will be other installation services that will clearly be reduced.

We have grown accustomed to some very high levels of service across the board in recent years and we all need to be forthcoming with the expectation that things will be different in some areas. Help manage this expectation across your garrisons. Educate everyone as to which changes they can expect to see. A simple explanation can go a long way to helping understand the changes some of

our installation services will undergo.

Across the Army's installations, we can do much to help ourselves by becoming better stewards of our resources. It starts with the individual; everybody has a role. Simple things like turning the lights off, powering down your computer at night, driving tactical vehicles instead of TMP vehicles or conducting a



VTC instead of traveling to a distant site unnecessarily all save money - and no savings is too small to forego.

Commanders and leaders across the installation have a key role and are responsible for the efficient use of our resources. Costs should be an inherent consideration in your every decision. We too often marginalize this key factor in making good, resource-informed decisions but we can no longer afford to do so.

As I travel throughout the Army community, I carry the message that we can do business smarter and more efficiently without sacrificing the quality of service that our Soldiers and their families so richly deserve.

I challenge everyone to do the same; to work together to ensure that those key installation programs that mean so much are well resourced and operated; that we do away with wasteful and unnecessary spending.

Every person - whether you are a Soldier, Family member, one of our great DA Civilians or a contractor serving our Army - is needed and can make a difference.

Ask yourself if you are doing the right things and then, are you doing them right. Doing things right means doing them in the most cost efficient way without sacrificing effectiveness.



## 'TIS THE SEASON

The holidays are upon us, and with it comes important safety tips to help you enjoy a safe, healthy and happy holiday season, while ensuring our military community conserves energy.

The United States Army Garrison Schweinfurt Safety Office urges those on post to limit the use of decorative lighting and turn lights on only between the hours of 5 and 11 p.m. except on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, New Year's Eve, and New Year's Day, where lights can be on from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. Decorative lighting should

come down by Monday, Jan. 4, 2010. External decorative lighting is permissible but use only approved outdoor lights and do not string between buildings.

Furthermore, use the following checklist to prevent accidents:

- Check condition of electrical outlets, safety caps, and electrical cords.
- Keep burning candles away from young children
- Don't plug too many extension cords into each other

# Customs shopping guide for the holidays

MANNHEIM, Germany - Some people are just not good at buying the right gifts. This is usually a matter of taste. However, people new to Europe should note that many items available in Europe that seem like good Christmas presents violate U.S. customs rules.

Some products are banned from the United States and others may be carried in baggage, but not mailed. Violations of customs, agriculture or postal regulations can lead to hefty fines up to \$5,000 and confiscation of the goods.

Meat products are the biggest problems, said Bill Johnson, director of the European Command's Customs and Border Clearance Agency.

"European delicacies like French pâté, German wurst, Spanish chorizo salami and Italian Parma ham are here for the buying and much sought-after in the States," he said. "Unfortunately, they can also carry the spores of Foot and Mouth Disease, a virulent livestock ailment eradicated in the United States." These products are therefore banned, as are canned meats and even soup mixes or pasta containing meat. Fresh fruits and vegetables are also prohibited because they could harbor pests like the Mediterranean fruit fly.

The U.S. Postal Service bans all liquor from being mailed, even if it is inside a piece of candy. However, customs allows

travelers over 21 years of age to import one liter of duty-free liquor. Johnson said the federal taxes and duties are currently low enough to make it worthwhile to take more than one liter of beer or wine stateside as gifts. However, state laws must also be met which can add to the cost. Taxes on distilled spirits like Scotch whiskey are generally considered high, he noted.

Cuban rum and cigars are also available in Europe but prohibited from import stateside by economic sanctions.

Additionally, buying ivory as a gift is a bad idea, according to customs officials. "Only ivory pieces previously registered with Customs and Border Protection may be imported," Johnson continued. Whale teeth carvings, known as netsuke or scrimshaw, are also prohibited from import. When buying furs, shoppers should insist on a certificate of origin stating the animal's scientific name to avoid buying prohibited endangered species products. The movement of caviar is also restricted.

Shoppers should realize that they should not mail nativity scenes that contain moss, bark, pinecones, untreated straw or other materials found to contain insects.

# Customs pamphlet eases holiday mail rush

MANNHEIM, Germany - Mailing packages stateside from Europe involves many prohibitions, restrictions and import duty rules. U.S. personnel can avoid the pitfalls by getting the "International Mail Imports" pamphlet from a military customs office, which lists items that are banned.

A customs declaration must be fixed to every parcel going to the States and falsifying it is a federal crime.

"You must also realize that foreign-made goods sent to the United States are subject to the payment of duty," Johnson cautioned.

"Even if you mail the items to yourself or buy them in a military exchange, the recipient may still have to pay duty and the customs user fee," he explained.

U.S. residents may receive up to \$100 worth of foreign-made goods per day, but have to pay duty on the total value of gifts exceeding that amount.


